



Carr Lodge Academy – Review of Sports Premium Spending 2021/22

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- In line with wider Academy Development Plan, break and lunchtimes to be further developed to ensure that pupils are actively engaged in physical activity often, and to reduce the number of behavioural incidents that result from inactivity.
- A range of organised, structured activities should be offered in order to bolster those already established and to make further use of the playground markings and heavy-duty playground equipment already acquired.
- Playground leaders to be trained once routines are more established and to meet regularly with PE coordinators and Activ8 staff to develop the delivery of engaging activities.
- Access the full range of inter-school competitions hosted by Activ8 (and some other providers) so that more pupils are engaged in out-of-school competitive sport.
- Monitoring of assessment strategies in curricular PE to ensure that children are taking ownership of this and they are aware of strengths and next steps in their learning.
- Activ8 staff to support class teachers in the delivery of high-quality PE lessons when in school, utilising a 'team teach' format, in order to maximise their effectiveness (Wednesdays and Thursdays).
- All teaching staff to complete an audit to establish areas of strength and weakness and for this to then be used to inform CPD.
- Class teachers to be informally observed when teaching PE to ensure they are upskilling their learning and delivery of the subject.
- 'Your PE' platform to be used by all teaching staff to plan and assess PE lessons. The PE coordinator and Activ8 staff should then use this to monitor the assessment and delivery of PE lessons across the school.
- Your PE platform and Activ8 staff to ensure that skills progression across school is both clear and consistent, as we are striving for in other subjects.
- Trust links being continually built upon to ensure a consistent approach to school sport and to allow opportunities for pupils to participate in competitive sport against fellow trust schools.
- School staff to ensure pupils are well prepared to compete in intra and inter-school competitions through targeted sessions and extra-curricular activities.

Package includes full-school access to the ‘Your PE’ platform, delivery of lessons over 2 full days per week, support with lunchtime activities, delivery of after-school clubs 2 days per week, entry to all Activ8 competitions throughout the year, 2 CPD twilight sessions and Playground Leaders training.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Using a ‘team teach’ format, to build upon previous support, Activ8 staff to build teachers confidence and aptitude in delivering ‘high-quality’ curriculum PE. ‘Activ8 lead; both lead; class teacher leads’, with Activ8 staff informally observing and giving feedback to class teachers, then working to address any areas of development that they identify together, in line with other academy peer coaching practices. • Develop playground leaders to ensure pupils are engaged in activities. • Deliver before and after-school sports clubs to raise participation in sports. • Develop a robust lunchtime activity program for all pupils. • Deliver lunchtime activity sessions to pupils. • Coach children for specific sports for inter-school competitions. • Increased participation in inter and intra school competitions. • Raise the quality of curriculum PE delivery through specialist provision and training • In line with wider Academy Development Plan, break and lunchtimes to be further developed to ensure that pupils are actively engaged and using playground markings and equipment properly and to their full potential. • Playground leaders to be trained later in the school year, once routines are more established, and to meet regularly with PE coordinators and Activ8 staff to develop the delivery of engaging activities. • Access the full range of inter-school competitions hosted by Activ8 (and some other providers) so that more pupils are engaged in out-of-school competitive sport. • Activ8 staff to support class teachers in the delivery of high-quality PE lessons when in school (Wednesdays and Thursdays). • After collecting staff audit data, continue to provide regular support and training for teachers - use of Activ8 staff support to provide CPD based around identified needs. • Activ8 staff to assist PE leads in ensuring that the ‘Your PE’ platform is being utilised properly and consistently across the academy, including support staff where needed and helping to ensure a consistent teaching and assessment of skills. 	<p>Percentage of overall budget: 49%</p>	<p>*Please note that this figure has been revised from its original quote and is now £11,423, not £9,511 as first thought.</p> <p>Owen has so far worked with almost all members of staff across the whole academy. In this time, he has been working towards the 3-step coaching model outlined at the start of the year, however this was impacted upon for a short time by staff absence due to Covid and Norovirus during the winter months. Things seem to have returned to normal since many measures have been lifted and transmission rates are lower.</p> <p>Since we have new starters in September and people moving Year groups, we intend on continuing working with Owen using this development model. Unlike other schools, that often opt to use companies like Activ8 to ‘outsource’ their PE teaching (often during PPA time), we plan to continue working with Owen and his staff to develop our own teaching of PE, for a more sustainable long-term gain.</p> <p>In the new school year, it will be even more essential that all staff are clearly recording assessment of their class’ learning in PE to begin creating a clear picture of PE across the academy for SLT, the PE coordinator and any assessing body.</p>

Intention 2: Trim Trail with ‘Rubber Mulch’ safety grounding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To further maximise sustainable development of the school site, a ‘Trim Trail’ wooden climbing frame to be purchased to offer additional ways for children to play and develop key physical skills including upper body and core strength, balance, grip, coordination, decision making and more. • It has been recommended to us during a Health and Safety visit that if we were to purchase a trim trail, that we also buy ‘rubber mulch’ surfacing as this will allow children to play safely on the frame during almost all times of the year, with a far smaller risk of slipping and causing injury due to a muddy surface. • If feasible, the Trim Trail would be located in the corner of the school field, bordering the Key Stage 1 playground, where it can be broadly accessed without posing a problem for further expansion of the school site in years to come. 	Percentage of overall budget: 26%	Actual spend: £5,000 We were pleased to be able to afford a trim trail, due to a discount offered to us by a company we have worked with previously. This was thought at times to be unobtainable this year, with quotes usually stretching between £6,000-£10,000 mark, depending on additional extras. We are satisfied that we have a design catered to the needs of our pupils, that we can add to at a later date, should we choose to.

Intention 3: Hire external specialist providers to bolster variety of experiences, sports and activities on offer during Fitness Fortnight.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue to grow FF to include more activities for those who find it difficult to engage in competitive sport. • Maintain strong links with local clubs and providers and continue to distribute promotional information regarding their clubs in and out of term time. • PE coordinator to maintain links with local clubs and providers throughout the year. This may include providing mutual benefits, wherein providers offer free sessions during Fitness Fortnight in exchange for promotion of their club/business within school and via school website/social media. • All staff within school to draw upon their contacts to provide as much varied, bespoke provision during Fitness Fortnight that can be offered on a voluntary basis (e.g. local martial art clubs may volunteer to offer taster sessions during FF, with a view that our students may choose to sign up to their clubs following the sessions). • Sessions that can’t be provided voluntarily, either by school staff or by volunteer agencies, to be funded by the allocated amount above. The remaining funds from this were used to offset part of the increased Activ8 cost.</p>

Percentage of overall budget: 5%	<p>After initial plans to broaden afterschool clubs were hampered by Covid restrictions during the Autumn and Spring terms, we explored the option of running clubs in the summer term instead.</p> <p>After the cost of Activ8 was found to be higher than expected, alongside the demand to buy a Trim Trail and the cost of Fitness Fortnight approaching, we made the decision to look at revisiting this goal in September 2022. In spite of this, we were still able to offer three sports-related clubs this year, with Mr Gill and Mr Mackintosh running practice sessions in the build up to sporting events and Activ8 offering afterschool clubs throughout the whole year as part of their ongoing service agreement with us.</p>
