



Carr Lodge Academy – Intention of Sports Premium Spending 2020/21 (Review)

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- In line with wider Academy Development Plan, break and lunchtimes to be further developed to ensure that pupils are actively engaged in physical activity often, and to reduce the number of behavioural incidents that result from inactivity.
- Playground leaders to be trained and to meet regularly with PE coordinators to develop the delivery of engaging activities.
- Access the full range of inter-school competitions hosted by Activ8 (and some other providers) so that more pupils are engaged in out-of-school competitive sport.
- Monitoring of assessment strategies in curricular PE to ensure that children are taking ownership of this and they are aware of strengths and next steps in their learning.
- All teaching staff to receive refresher training in real PE scheme, along with access to 'Jasmine' planning and assessment app. (paid for in previous fiscal year).
- Activ8 staff to support class teachers in the delivery of high-quality PE lessons when in school (Wednesdays and Thursdays).
- All teaching staff to complete an audit to establish areas of strength and weakness and for this to then be used to inform CPD.
- Class teachers to be further observed when teaching PE to ensure they are upskilling their learning and delivery of the subject and that both YourPE and realPE schemes are being taught effectively.
- Trust links being continually built upon to ensure a consistent approach to school sport and to allow opportunities for pupils to participate in competitive sport against fellow trust schools.
- School staff to ensure pupils are well prepared to compete in intra and inter-school competitions through targeted sessions and extra-curricular activities.

Percentage of overall budget: 53%	Activ8 have proven very effective at working with our teaching staff in the 2020/21 school year. Due to several new staff starting since last September, it is felt that Activ8 can continue to have a significant impact upon school PE in the 2021-22 school year. For this reason, we plan to employ them again, using a ‘team teach’ approach to developing staff confidence in delivery high quality PE lessons with clear outcomes for all pupils. Additionally, we feel that they will be able to help us further improve lunchtimes and breaktimes by aiding in developing a structured activity menu for all pupils, eventually boosted by the use of playground leaders later in the school year once routines are more established. Finally, we plan on using them to add to our afterschool provision in the new school year as this was consistently well-received when it was allowed to run again following Covid restrictions.

Intention 2: Playground Markings	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We will continue to use the zonal system introduced during COVID-19 as this has provided a good structure for breaktimes and lunchtime and seen a reduction in behavioural incidents. • Playground markings in each zone will allow pupils to take part in organised activities whilst keeping active. • Markings will be designed to allow for cross-curricular links to learning in other ‘active lessons’. • Markings will support in the implementation and delivery of organised games at lunchtimes for lunchtime supervisors and playground leaders. • By having a variety of markings in each area, students will have a menu of activities in which to take part every breaktime. 	Percentage of overall budget: 27%	We were fortunate enough to negotiate a substantial discount which allowed us to purchase up to £6,000 worth of playground markings, covering both Key Stage 1 and 2 playgrounds. We were understandably thrilled with this as this was more than we had initially anticipated. More work is needed to ensure that the markings are being used effectively at lunchtimes but they are already proving very popular during breaktimes and in some PE lessons, where applicable. For the new school year, it has been decided that we will be returning to non-zonal breaktimes, although this will be reviewed periodically as per the academy development plan.

Intention 3: Hire external specialist providers to bolster variety of experiences, sports and activities on offer during Fitness Fortnight.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue to grow FF to include more activities for those who find it difficult to engage in competitive sport. • Maintain strong links with local clubs and providers and continue to distribute promotional information regarding their clubs in and out of term time. • PE coordinator to maintain links with local clubs and providers throughout the year. This may include providing mutual benefits, wherein providers offer free sessions during Fitness Fortnight in exchange for promotion of their club/business within school and via school website/social media. • All staff within school to draw upon their contacts to provide as much varied, bespoke provision during Fitness Fortnight that can be offered on a voluntary basis (e.g. local martial art clubs may volunteer to offer taster sessions during FF, with a view that our students may choose to sign up to their clubs following the sessions). 	Percentage of overall budget: 11%	We were thrilled that Fitness Fortnight was able to go ahead this year, following many prior restrictions due to Covid-19. Furthermore, we were able to have more providers than ever before involved, offering the broadest range of experiences for our children since Carr Lodge opened in 2015. These experiences included First Aid, healthy eating, basketball, orienteering, team building, Scotty’s Heroes, dancing, yoga, mindfulness, extreme cycling and others. The real positive was that this felt like a very fitting way to cap off what had been an otherwise tumultuous year, nationally. It was great to see physical and mental

In their place, we still took part in several virtual competitions throughout the year, both as an academy and against other local schools outside of Exceed. This allocation was instead used to restock and replenish depleted or damaged PE stock, which was much needed.</p>
